

Our live festival in 2020 had to be abandoned due to Covid, but despite this setback, we were able to reach our loyal audience (and a number of new faces) through our much-appreciated online festival. And – notwithstanding the challenges we all faced last year – I am absolutely thrilled to report that we achieved a major milestone in our fund-raising for charity with over **one million pounds** raised for charity since Proms' inception in 1993. This remarkable

achievement bears testimony to the wonderful support of our many sponsors, supporters and hard-working volunteers.

Since then, his concert performances and discography have established him as a pianist of integrity and variety, bringing freshness and vitality to the classical, romantic and 20th century repertoire. He is playing Haydn: Piano Sonata in C Hob XVI:50; Grieg: Two Norwegian Peasant Dances; and Schumann: Davidsbündlertänze, regarded as one of the greatest piano works of the Romantic Era.



Central to the ensemble's ethos is a celebration of diverse musical expression and a commitment to musical education.

The concert also marks the world première of Proms' commissioned *The Innocents* (music by Patrick Hawes, libretto by Andrew Hawes). It commemorates the sinking of the evacuee ship SS City of Benares in 1940 and those lost at sea, including 77 children. Michael Rennie (the son of the then vicar at St Jude's) died trying to save the children.



Hilary Mantel in Conversation with Mark Lawson

David Cohen Memorial Interview

Double Booker prize winner **Hilary Mantel** delivers the inaugural Memorial Interview in honour of our late patron, Dr David Cohen CBE, whose eponymous literary prize she won in 2013.

Billed as the publishing event of 2020, and now in paperback, *The Mirror and the Light* brings to a triumphant close the trilogy she began with *Wolf Hall* and *Bring Up the Bodies*, both of which have been awarded the Man Booker Prize. In it she traces the final years of Thomas Cromwell, the boy from nowhere who climbs to the heights of power.

Hilary Mantel has written 15 books including A Place of Greater Safety, Beyond Black, the memoir Giving Up the Ghost and the short story collection The Assassination of Margaret Thatcher.

She is in conversation with **Mark Lawson**, journalist, broadcaster, author and a Fellow of the Royal Society for Literature, who presented Front Row on BBC Radio 4 from 1998 to 2014. Mark chaired the judges of the David Cohen Prize for Literature from 2011 to 2019, has twice been voted TV Critic of the Year and has won numerous awards for arts journalism. He writes for the *Guardian* and presents *Mark Lawson Talks To* ... on BBC Four.

Sathnam Sanghera

Empireland explores the ways imperialism has shaped Britain and examines the culture wars making the headlines – from statue toppling to Rule Britannia at the BBC Proms. Acclaimed journalist **Sathnam Sanghera** argues that imperialism is everywhere although we often choose not to see it. Author of the autobiographical The Boy with the Topknot – which was adapted as a BBC drama – he is in conversation with **Kavita Puri**, journalist and author of Partition Voices.

Kadiatu Kanneh-Mason



Fast forward 40-plus years and her cellist son Sheku would steal the show at Harry and Meghan's wedding and, with his siblings, go on to entrance the world.

Philippe Sands


A Holocaust mass murderer on the run, an international race to bring him to justice ... this is the compelling background to **Philippe Sands'** part memoir, part detective story *The Ratline*. Fugitive Brigadeführer Otto von Wächter, responsible for the murders of hundreds of thousands of Jews in Poland – including Sands' grandfather – came close to evading retribution before meeting an unlamented end days before he was due to be smuggled to Argentina. Sands is one of the UK's most prominent human rights lawyers.


Rory Cellan-Jones


SUNDAY 27 JUNE 12.15-13.15 David Nott

He is now widely acknowledged as the world's most experienced trauma expert. In his book *War Doctor* he tells the gripping story of life on the front line, carrying out life-saving operations in the most challenging conditions.

In *The Lost Homestead*, famed human rights lawyer **Marina Wheeler** tells the dramatic story of her Sikh mother's desperate escape from her home, never to return, during the 1947 Partition of India. As an Anglo-Indian – her father was the distinguished BBC journalist Charles Wheeler – Marina succeeds in making sense of her mother's experience through accounts from her Indian family plus her own research and travels.

John Preston

What happened to turn war hero, MP, media mogul and would-be English gentleman Robert Maxwell into a bloated, amoral wreck? His previous book *A Very English Scandal* became a BAFTA-winning BBC drama series.
